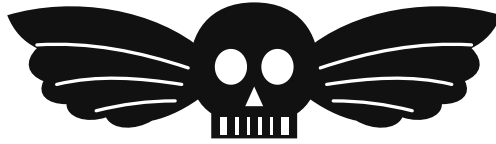

THE REAL STONE

Elizabeth Belcher, Old Burying-Ground, Cambridge, Massachusetts. Text as transcribed in W. T. Harris, *Epitaphs from the Old Burying-Ground in Cambridge* (1845), p. 8. Library of Congress, loc.gov/item/06005886.

"Cambridg" is spelled that way in the transcription. Ætatis suæ 62: aged 62.

SCALE IT UP

At 100% the stone prints 6.75 in wide by 8.25 in tall. For a stone 30 in tall, enlarge to **360%**: tile it across sheets, or project it onto foam board and trace.

THE REAL STONE

Edward Gray, Burial Hill, Plymouth, Massachusetts. Text as transcribed in Bradford Kingman, *Epitaphs from Burial Hill, Plymouth* (1892), no. 3. Library of Congress, loc.gov/item/06013063.

Line breaks follow Kingman. Pilgrim Hall Museum lists Gray's 1681 stone first of the five on Burial Hill with 17th century dates.

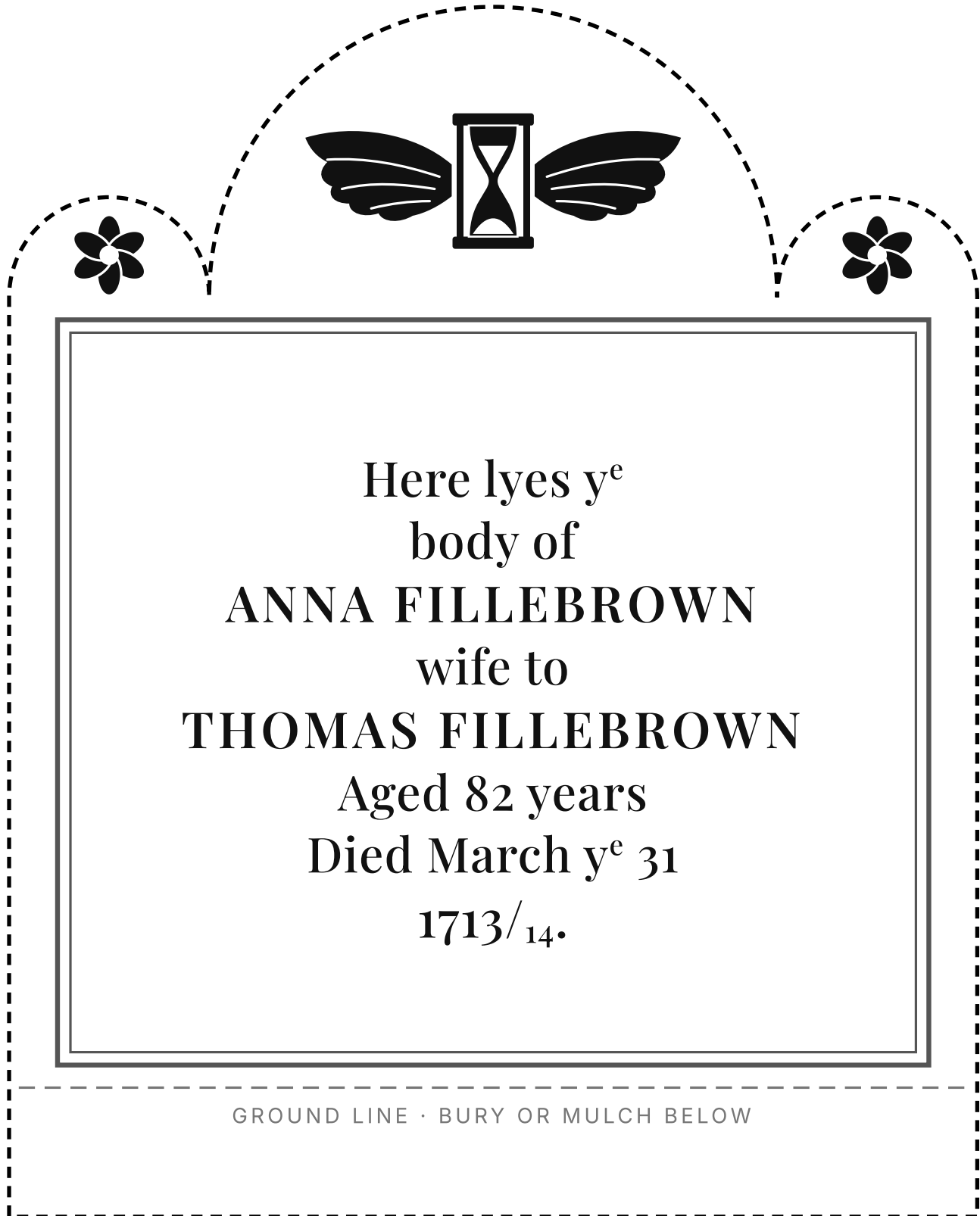
SCALE IT UP

At 100% the stone prints 7.75 in wide by 7.5 in tall. For a stone 30 in tall, enlarge to **398%**: tile it across sheets, or project it onto foam board and trace.

A Double Date, 1713/14



THE REAL STONE

Anna Fillebrown, Old Burying-Ground, Cambridge, Massachusetts. Text as transcribed in W. T. Harris, *Epitaphs from the Old Burying-Ground in Cambridge* (1845), p. 47. Library of Congress, loc.gov/item/06005886.

Harris explains that under the Old Style calendar the year began on March 25, so a date before then could carry both years.

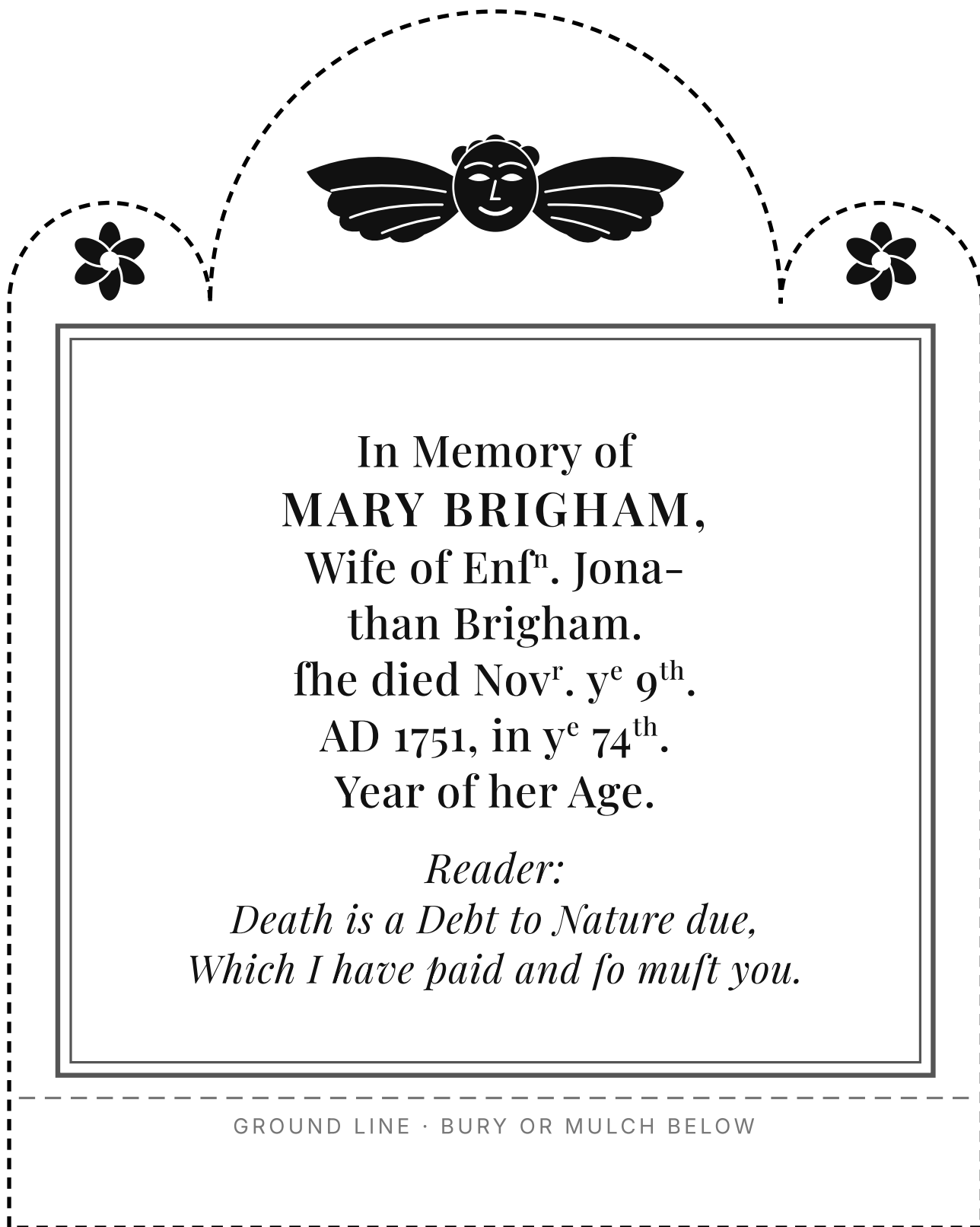
SCALE IT UP

At 100% the stone prints 6.75 in wide by 8.25 in tall. For a stone 30 in tall, enlarge to **360%**: tile it across sheets, or project it onto foam board and trace.

Death Is a Debt, 1751



THE REAL STONE

Mary Brigham, Old Common Burial Ground, Marlborough, Massachusetts. Text as transcribed in Franklin P. Rice, Marlborough, Massachusetts, Burial Ground Inscriptions (1908), no. 74, p. 23. Library of Congress, loc.gov/item/08017408.

Rice records a cherub's head. He prints the last verse line in brackets, his mark for text he restored, so it is probably not a reading.

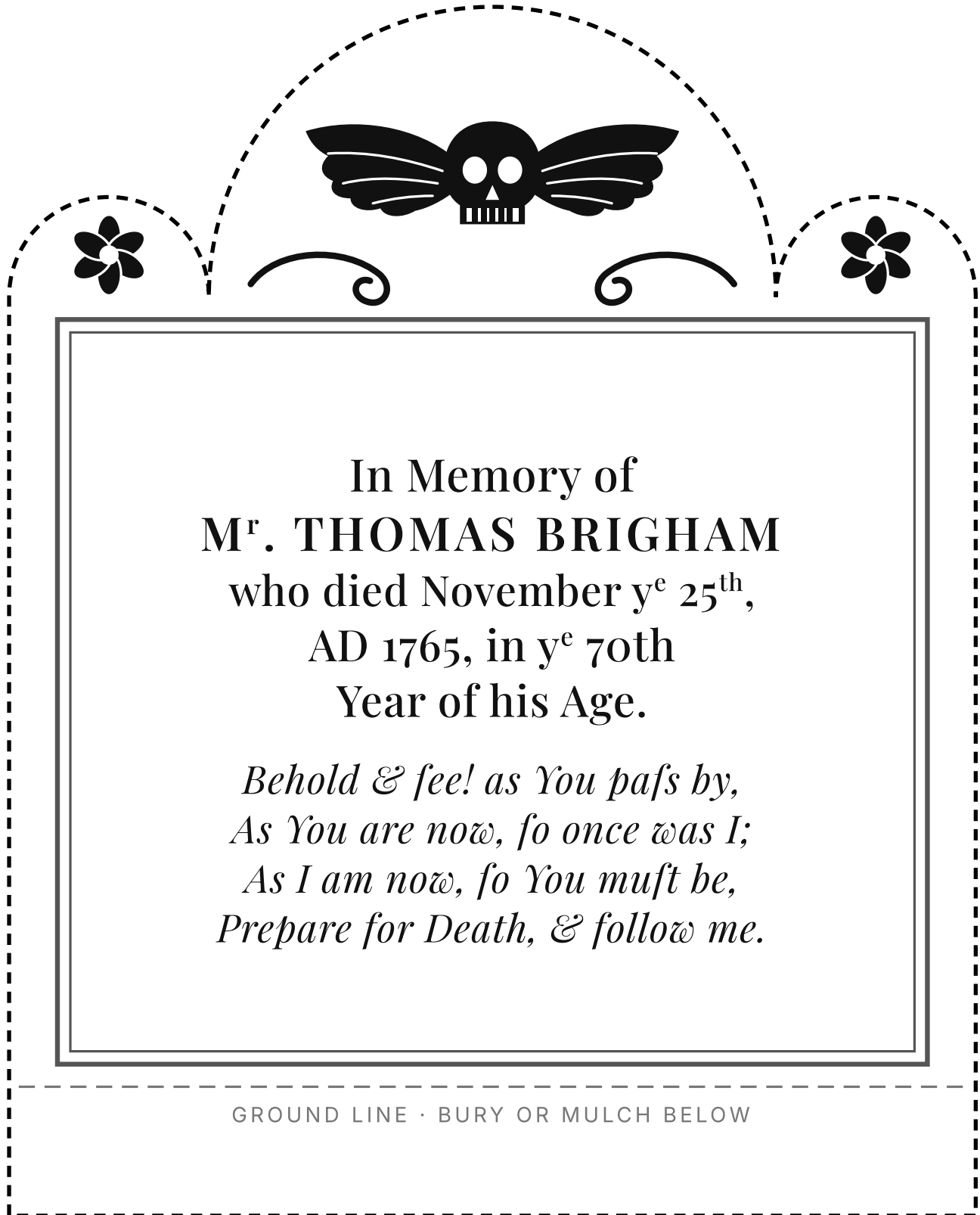
SCALE IT UP

At 100% the stone prints 6.75 in wide by 8.25 in tall. For a stone 30 in tall, enlarge to **360%**: tile it across sheets, or project it onto foam board and trace.

As You Pass By, 1765



THE REAL STONE

Thomas Brigham, Old Common Burial Ground, Marlborough, Massachusetts.

Text as transcribed in Franklin P. Rice, Marlborough, Massachusetts, Burial Ground Inscriptions (1908), no. 87, p. 26. Library of Congress, loc.gov/item/08017408.

Rice records a rose, a death's head and scrolls on this stone.

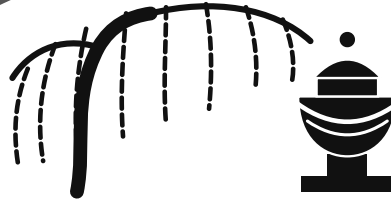
SCALE IT UP

At 100% the stone prints 6.75 in wide by 8.25 in tall. For a stone 30 in tall, enlarge to **360%**: tile it across sheets, or project it onto foam board and trace.

THE REAL STONE

Elizabeth Savery, Burial Hill, Plymouth, Massachusetts. Text as transcribed in Frank H. Perkins, Handbook of Old Burial Hill, Plymouth (1902), p. 47. Library of Congress, loc.gov/item/02018019.

The last line really does read "to follow me." Perkins gives the text without line breaks; the layout is ours.

SCALE IT UP

At 100% the stone prints 6.5 in wide by 8.25 in tall. For a stone 30 in tall, enlarge to **360%**: tile it across sheets, or project it onto foam board and trace.

Your Own Name, 1765 Style



THE REAL STONE

Blank copy of the Thomas Brigham design. Letter the name and date by hand.

The verse is from Thomas Brigham's 1765 stone as transcribed in Franklin P. Rice, Marlborough, Massachusetts, Burial Ground Inscriptions (1908), no. 87. Library of Congress, [loc.gov/item/08017408](https://www.loc.gov/item/08017408).

Write the date the way Thomas Brigham's stone does: "November y^e 25th" and "in y^e 70th Year of his Age."

SCALE IT UP

At 100% the stone prints 6.75 in wide by 8.25 in tall. For a stone 30 in tall, enlarge to **360%**: tile it across sheets, or project it onto foam board and trace.
